

Overall structure:



Junior Council

Junior Council consists of year 3 to 4 student leaders who are involved in improving the student's schooling lives through organising multiple school related activities. Being one of the most sought-after leadership positions, it offers its student councillors a wide range of leadership development opportunities and event preparation skills. As a team of around 25 students, they are grouped into two major teams, the Spirit comm and the welfare comm, each lead by two y4 councillors.

Spirit Comm

In Spirit Committee, we plan initiatives like Spirit Week which happened in T3W1, as well as lead you in cheering and supporting other NUSHies at events like SSEF and the upcoming National STEM Challenge (NSC), all with the aim of raising school spirit and making school life memorable for you!

Welfare Comm

In Welfare Committee, we take care of the welfare aspect of the students, through the initiatives like the Welfhacks, Campus Closet, songs on Fun Friday and the Pre-Exam Welfare initiatives, which hopes to bring more joy to the students' lives.

Apart from these two broad committees, there are a few ad-hoc teams of around 15 students that student councillors can join. These encompasses numerous different school events and council activities, and each team will plan and host the respective activities.

SLI Publicity: Making use of the Students Council Instagram page to publish publicity materials about the Student Leaders Investiture.

Talk-to-Council Form: Launching a form to gather feedback from the students for the student councillors to be more connected with the school population.

Mascot and Memorabilia: The introduction of Novus, the mascot of NUS High at various school events like orientation, games day, SSEF, Speech Day and CCA Fair.

International Friendship Day: Conducting activities related to International Friendship Day for the school

Application Process:

Application into the junior council is a very competitive Process: as every year, prospective year 2 students will try their best to go through the Selection Process: in hopes to get into

the junior council. The Process: is very rigorous, with multiple vetting and Selection Process:es to ensure the quality of the students in the junior council.

Requirements

- > Conduct grade of Very Good or Better
- > Minimum GPA of 3.8

Process:

- > Chat with Council session (find out more about council from the council members, through personal sharing and insights into council)

Application Form

- > Application form to collect administrative details and some questions to gauge the candidates' interest and character.

Interview and Probation Phase

- > Eligible candidates will proceed to both the interview and probation phases. There will be an individual interview with a senior councillor and two junior councillors to learn more about the candidate
- I> Council generally focuses on both competencies and values in their Selection, and emphasises that hard skills will not be assessed, and previous leadership experience will not be credited.
- > Some of the values that are taken into consideration includes (but not limited to), Responsibility; Heart to serve; initiative and attitude.

Result Release

- > Students that meet council's requirements will be accepted into the junior council. They will serve for two years, from Year 3 to Year 4. If the applicant applied in Year 3 (only applicable for new Year 3 intake students), they will serve in their 4th year.

Senior Council

The senior council is a branch of council for the senior high students. Being the seniors in the school, they will lead and work with the junior council in their day-to-day operations as well as assist in the planning of school wide events like the Open House and the Student Leaders Summit.

Each elected senior councillor will also play a part in school affairs and try their best to improve the different aspects of the school life as per their campaign promises. Being a senior councillor, one will be expected to have a strong sense of character and be a good role model to lead a team effectively and be aware of the needs of the different stakeholders.

The admission into the senior council is rather different as compared to the junior council, as prospective candidates will engage in an election to be elected to the senior council. These emboldens the democratic nature of the senior councillors and serves as a good chance for students to choose who to represent them in the student's council.

Election Process:

1. Preliminary Vetting

Prospective candidates will fill up an application form for the senior's council, for candidates to fill in questions about themselves, their campaign plans, and ambitions for council. Teachers will give inputs for the candidates and will ensure that the campaign and ambitions are acceptable. Thereafter, candidates that do not get vetoed will progress to the next round. It is worth to note that most candidates will move on to the next round unless one has severe red flags on them

2. Campaign

Each candidate will be given a few opportunities to advocate for their causes and to publicise their campaign. This will last for around a week. Some methods are as follows: -

a. “Elevated Pitches” during morning assembly

Each candidate will be given one minute to speak in front of the school regarding their campaign and to publicise their causes

b. An Instagram post on council’s Instagram page

Each candidate will be given a post to publicise themselves.

c. **Physical Posters**

Each candidate will be given a few physical poster slots to place around the school to advocate for their cause.

d. **QnA**

During a CCE slot, all candidates will engage in a question-and-answer session in front of the whole school, emceed by an incumbent senior councillor. Questions from the general school population will be collated through a Microsoft Form sent out to the school, and candidates will be given time to answer the questions on the spot.



3. **Cooling-Off Day**

Posters and all campaigns will have to stop, and the school population will be given a day to digest and make up their decision on which successor candidates to vote in to the next senior council.



4. **Voting Day**

All students and staff will be able to vote through a Microsoft form, by selecting the top few candidates that they would prefer to see in the student's council. The number of candidates that are selected differs by year, due to the differences in the number of candidates each year. The top few candidates by votes will then be elected to the next student senior council and will be able to carry out their duties and advocate for their cause that they have campaigned for.



5. **Senior Council ExCo**

The senior council will have 4 members in its executive committee, namely the president, vice president, treasurer and secretary. They will work closely with teachers to manage the council affairs and lead the student's council in their work. ExCo Selection will be held internally within the student's council, and prospective candidates will be voted in through a popular vote within council, with inputs and vetting from the teachers.



House

Leadership Structure



For each house:

1 Captain: Lead the house in the different activities

2 Vice Captains: Assist the captain in his/her roles

Division Reps: Plan and execute the house activities (around 10 for each division)

House members: All students are assigned to be in one of the 4 houses

House reps are assigned to plan the termly house meets for the school, as well as other house activities that are conducted by the respective houses. Each house is also allocated a week in the school term, where they can organise fun house related activities and their yearly house dinners with the members in the house.

Students in NUS High are allocated to one of the 4 different houses, with the aim to promote bonding between students of different years. This allows students to gain more connections with their schoolmates as well as their peers, through fun activities held throughout the school year, giving them a greater sense of identity in their schooling life.

Application Process: for House Representatives

Application

There will be a form sent out to new house applicants to indicate their interest, and all applicants, including current reps will have to fill it in. The form will have questions to gauge the applicant's personality and to know more about them.

Task Release

The applicants will be split into two categories, new and current representatives. They will each have a specific role to play and will be assessed differently.

- **New Representatives**

New representative applicants will be tasked to plan and execute the Term 3 House Meet and will be judged throughout the Process: (planning, execution and facilitation).

- **Current representatives**

Current house representatives will be judged on their performance throughout the year, and no existing reps are guaranteed a place as a representative.

Qualities

During the planning and execution phases, the house leaders will assess one's qualities during both the planning and execution phases. Some of the skills that are taken into consideration are as shown below.

Planning Phases

- Teamwork

Help each other out by building on one another's ideas and by updating each other on the current progress of an activity

- Communication

Pacing, tone and emphasis. Being able to communicate your ideas across clearly and carry out discussions efficiently

- Initiative

Be able to lead the discussion and help guide discussions towards objectives that need to be achieved

- Audience

Enlist colleagues to listen and to provide feedback

Execution Phases

- Crowd Management Skills

Be able to hype up the crowd and engage the audience while still maintaining control over the situation

- Proactivity

Step up to be the one who gives them mass briefings, set up the activity

- Teamwork

Help out and encourage one another, especially if you see that your teammate is struggling

- Adaptability

Be able to adapt and improvise to sudden changes and be able to think on the spot to overcome these challenges

- Confidence


Be willing to step out of your comfort zone to gain the attention of the audience and be able to engage them throughout the activity

Faraday

The Faraday house, named after the English Chemist and Physicist Michael Faraday, is one of the four houses in NUS High. He is more commonly known for his contribution towards the field of electrochemistry and electromagnetism.



Structure:



Each Faraday representative will be allocated to one of the three committees, namely Bonding, Welfare and Publicity. They work together to achieve the objectives of each of the committee.

Committees

Bonding: Handles in-school house initiatives, that improves the mental wellbeing of the students.

Welfare: Plans internal welfare initiatives like the Faraday Committee Outings, and external welfare initiatives like the exam welfare which provides Faradaians with exam timetables and goodie bags.

Prods: In charge of the production of house related materials, like the designing of timetable cards, fun Friday stories and the painting of the Faraday banners.

Apart from the committees, all representatives will be allocated to one of the three sub-committees, where representatives will work on the respective house week related matters.

Sub-committees

Storyline: Plans the storyline for the Finale act of the house week

Activities: Plans and executes the canteen booth activities and the finale activities

Finale: Plans the finale activities and dinner

Orientation

Lastly, during orientation, each house will be given a float and a performance segment during the finale of the orientation storyline. Faraday representatives will be allocated to one of the two, to lead and take part in the creation of the house float or the planning of the finale performance.

The committee system in Fibonacci is rather flexible and is tailored to each individual school event that is related to the houses. Each representative will be given the opportunity to plan a few of the different events and contribute to making the Fibonacci events a success.

Publicity: Creates and designs the publicity materials for the Fibonacci week

Activities: Plans the activities that are planned and conducted throughout the whole week




Fleming

The Fleming house, named after the Scottish scientist Sir Alexendra Fleming, is one of the four houses in NUS High. He is more commonly known for his discovery of penicillin, the world's first broadly effective antibiotic.



Structure:



Each Fleming representative is allocated into one of the three wings, namely internal welfare, external welfare and publicity, and each wing is led by two ICs.

Wings

Internal Welfare Wing: Plans the activities during the internal Fleming GMs. These GMs are for the Fleming reps, for them to bond together through these activities as well as to work on their respective events that they need to plan.

External Welfare Wing: Plans the external events for the school populace. These events are usually based, for the students of the Fleming house to gather to participate in.

Publicity Wing: Creates the publicity materials for the Fleming house's Instagram page. This includes the weekly Friday House Shirt posts to remind students to wear their house shirts and the termly house meet posts.

House Meets

Apart from the Wings, the Fleming reps are also tasked with the planning and execution of the termly house meets for the school populace. These activities usually take place during the Monday assembly slot or the Wednesday CCE slot.

The house reps will plan the activities for their respective divisions, Junior High or Senior High. These activities are aimed to engage the school populace through fun bonding activities to destress and to get to know more of their schoolmates.

Initiatives

There are also a few other initiatives that the Fleming representatives will help to plan, which are school events like Games Day or Flem Cares, in which the general school population will be able to take part in.

Orientation

Lastly, during orientation, each house will be given a float and a performance segment during the finale of the orientation storyline. Fleming representatives will be allocated to one of the two, to lead and take part in the creation of the house float or the planning of the finale performance.



The Nobel Representatives are each assigned to one of the three committees, Welfare, Events and Design, which plans and creates the respective materials for the committee.

Sub-committees

Welfare: The welfare sub-committee handles the activities for the student body and the Nobel committee welfare, through initiatives like the pre-exam care packs, the representative camp and outings.

Events: The events sub-committee plans events such as the Nobel cinematics, for house students and members to enjoy.

Design: The design sub-committee oversees the publicity related initiatives of the Nobel house, and handles publicity matters like the timetable cards that is given to every student of the Nobel house.

Apart from the fixed committees, there are other events that the Nobel representatives will also volunteer to help in, namely initiatives like the Games Day. Orientation and Timetables.

Nobel Week Committees

During Nobel week, the representatives will be allocated to one of the four different committees, to help in the planning and execution of an engaging and enjoyable Nobel Week for the students from the Nobel House.

Publicity: Create the different publicity materials for the activities during Nobel Week

Booths: Plan and execute fun and engaging activities during Nobel Week in the canteen

Non-Booths: Settle technical and administrative aspects of the Nobel Week activities, to allow Nobel Week to be a blast.

Finale: Plan and act out an engaging finale skit and activity for the house members to enjoy.

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





A central ExCo oversees both International (recreational and competitive) and Chinese chess. Within it, ExCo members are assigned to a particular chess section (Chinese/International) to manage its weekly operations and, for International Chess, its Events, Administration and Publicity.


Candidates are then interviewed by the teacher-in-charge to assess their suitability.



There will be a campaign Process: for interested applicants to express why they think they deserve to be in the executive committee. Each applicant will be given a time during the CCA session to give a speech to the club, which will then be followed up with a QnA session.

Voting Process:


Each student and teacher will be given 5 votes to vote for the top 5 candidates that they wish to vote for. The voting weightage are as follows, Students will get a 70% vote weightage, while the Teacher in charge and incumbent Year 6 Executive committee members will get a 30% vote weightage.

Selection

The student with the top three votes will be elected to the executive committee and will receive their roles of president or vice president based on their voting performance, with the president being the student that has obtained the most votes.

Robotics Club

Leadership Structure:



1 President: In charge of the running of the CCA and leading the ExCo members in the day-to-day operations of the CCA

2 Vice Presidents: In charge of a division in the CCA, Lego or Vex Robotics

3 Executive Committee Members: Work under the guidance of the Vice President to assist in the daily operations of the CCA

The executive members of the robotics club have an age limit of up to year 5. This is to lighten the workload of the Year 6s as well as to ensure that the CCA

Process:es can still operate after the Year 6s graduate.

The CCA is split into two different divisions, namely the Lego division and the Vex Robotics division.

Members are allocated into one of the two divisions to participate in the various school events. The Lego division focuses on building robots using Lego pieces, while the Vex Robotics division focuses on building robots using metal pieces called Vex.

A form will be sent out to all prospective candidates to apply for the executive committee


Interview + Selection

The incumbent ExCo members will facilitate the Selection Process: including an interview for them to know more about the candidates.

The teachers will also provide inputs for each candidate, before the ExCo members are selected.

Media Club

Leadership Structure:



1 President: Oversees all three sections and leads the CCA

3 Vice Presidents: Leads the relevant sections to conduct the relevant activities

10 Executive Committee Members: Assist the Vice President in the running of the respective sections

5 Shadow EXCO: Takes on some behind the scenes responsibilities without the full commitment of an executive committee member

The Media Club is split into 3 different divisions, encompassing the three aspects of a media department. Members of the media club are allocated to one of the three divisions, to help assist various media related aspects of the school, earning its title of being the “unseen hero” of most of the school events.

Photos Division: The photos division oversees photography aspects of the CCA, leading the photo taking programmes during school event, archiving the glory of the different school events in NUS High through the breathtaking photos by its members.

Videos Division: The videos division oversees videography works of the CCA, capturing videos of various school events and handing the livestreaming aspect of certain major school events.



Audio and Visual: The audio and visual division oversees all lighting, microphones, sound effects and organises the backstage work during school activities or Process:es.

ExCo Selection Process:

ExCo roles in media club are open to year 2s and above.

Indication of interest

A form to indicate interest in signing up for ExCo will be sent to all students, interested students may sign up through the form.


An interview will be held by the teachers in charge and the incumbent president, along with the individuals' traits, will be used to select the next batch of executive committee members.

Selection

The most suitable candidates will be selected into the executive committee.

Youth Flying Club

Leadership Structure:



1 President: Lead the entire CCA, guide the executive committee

2 Vice-Presidents: Assists the president in his/her duties

6 Executive Committee Members: Teach and manage activities within their section, ensuring smooth operation and skill progression for members.

The youth flying club is split into 5 different sections, namely the Introduction to Aviation, Glider, Remote Controlled (RC), Quadcopter (Quad) and the Self-Initiated Projects. Members will be able to join these sections to learn more about the different aspects of aerodynamics.




the entire CCA membership, with inputs provided by the previous batch of ExCo and teachers during Selection.

Leadership Structure:



1 President: Oversees the entire executive committee, leads the CCA in the respective sessions, liaise with other CCAs for concerts, and prepare logistics for performances and concerts that the CCA conducts.

1 Vice-President: Assist the president in his/her duties

5 Sectional Leaders: Lead the respective divisions during CCA sessions

Apart from their prescribed roles as shown above, each executive committee member is also involved in three different committees in its administrative matters. The three committees are internally allocated within the executive committee, and the leaders will handle the respective aspects that they are allocated to.

The three committees are as follows:

Welfare: In charge of members welfare, organize activities during the CO Camps and ensures the cleanliness of the CO room

Publicity: In charge of the publicity of the CCA through Instagram or physical posters

Admin/VIA: In charge of the instrument logistics and organizes the VIA for the CCA

Application

Application forms will be sent out to the whole CCA, students can either nominate others or self-nominate themselves for the role. Generally, only selected year 2s and above can apply for an executive committee position (to be in ExCo in y3).


There will be interviews conducted by the teachers and incumbent presidents for the roles of president and vice president,

Voting + Selection

Voting will be conducted for the President and Vice President roles, in which prospective candidates will be given the opportunity to give a CCA wide speech for 2 minutes, and then everyone will be given a vote for both the president and the vice president. The candidate with the most votes for the respective roles will be elected to the next executive committee.

High School Choir

Leadership Structure:



1 President: Maintain direct communication with teachers for school events and take a larger role in planning.

1 Vice President: Assists the President in his/her roles.

2 Executive Committee Members: Each share equal responsibility for logistics and discussions related to internal events.

1-2 Sectional Leaders per section (Soprano, Alto, Tenor, Bass): Ensure members practice regularly and guide them through scores during “sectionals” (practice sessions held outside of CCA time). They are not involved in school event planning or logistics.


During the Choir CCA Camp held at the end of the year, applicants will deliver a 3-minute speech regarding their executive committee campaign. Afterwards, each member of the CCA will be given one vote per executive committee position to choose who they think is the most suitable candidate

Selection

The most suitable candidate for each role will be selected after considering inputs from the incumbent executive committee, teachers and the voting results.

Dance Club

Leadership Structure:



1 President: Oversees all CCA related matters, leads the ExCo members to run the CCA related activities

1 Vice President: Assists the president in his/her job and steps in when any of the ExCo members need help

2 Executive Committee Members: Have assigned tasks to execute and plan with guidance from the president and vice president


C division executive committee members are chosen by the teacher in charge based on overall attitude and leadership potential

The Computer Science Interest Group has a division structure for its members to participate in. Students are split into two divisions, the Projects division and the CTF (Capture the Flag) division, where they participate and organise the respective activities within their divisions. Additionally, there is another ad-hoc division, the publicity/outreach division, for interested members to apply to enter.

Projects Division

The projects division focuses mainly on building applications together as an interest group. Collectively, the members will be able to immerse themselves with different aspects of building a computer software, coding, infrastructure and bug fixing. These applications can sometimes be used to enhance the school's administrative aspects, as these applications that are developed have been used in various school events, like the open house and the EXCITE activities.





CTF Division (Capture the Flag)

The Capture the Flag division is focused on cybersecurity, learning more about the importance of building secure networks and the technical skills to safeguard the security of software. The division's name is derived from the popular cybersecurity competition called "Capture the Flag", where participants solve different complex cybersecurity questions in a short period of time.

Within each division, members will also be given the opportunity to step up and lead the respective projects that they would wish to propose for the interest group, while being led by an executive committee member. Although this is an unofficial leadership role, this would be a golden opportunity for students to develop their leadership capabilities while also leading a cause that they are passionate about.

ExCo Selection Process:

There is a tradition of an age quota for the executive committee members within AppVenture. There will often be 3-year 6s and year 5s, as well as a new intake year 4 in the middle of the year, to ensure that the IG has a variety of ages leading the interest group and that the younger leaders can develop the necessary skills to continue the initiatives when the year 6s graduate.

Application

Interested students will apply for the roles that they are interested in, through a form with simple personal questions to get to know the applicant better. This will allow the incumbent ExCo and the teacher in charge to gain a deeper understanding of what they plan to do for the IG and how they envision the direction of the IG to be.

Interview

Students will be selected through the responses within the form to undergo an interview with the incumbent ExCo members and the teacher in charge, to further gauge their suitability for the executive committee roles.

Selection

Selected students will be given the respective executive committee roles for the next year and will lead the direction of the interest group.







ICs (unofficial ExCo role): Leads the different initiatives under the guidance of the division leader

The English Language interest group is split into 4 divisions, namely the Elysium division, Lexicon division, Insight division and the Genesis division. Each division focuses on a certain aspect of the English language, to allow students to spread their love for the English language through divisional activities. Namely, the four divisions are as follows:

ICs: guided by the division leaders, dv decides how many people they recruit, lead the different sub comms, not official leadership role. IC Selection: forms, more on interest,

ExCo Selection Process: (coordinated by incumbent president and IG teachers)

Indication of Interest

A form will be sent out in term 3, to indicate interest in the executive committee roles. Interested applicants will fill out some questions for the teachers to get to know more about the applicant. IC roles are assigned by the respective division leaders after they have been selected.

Vetting

The Interest Group teacher in charge will vet through all applicants, to gauge their suitability. If there are more than one applicant that did not get vetoed by the teachers for the roles of president and vice president, there will be an election held to select the leaders. However, the Selection of division leaders are purely decided by the teachers and will not go through an election Process: regardless of the number of candidates approved.

Elections

All approved candidates applying for the role of President or Vice-President will be given time to deliver a short speech to the whole interest group. Afterwards, every student in the interest group will be given the opportunity to select one candidate for each role through a Microsoft form. Students will also be given the opportunity to cast “spoilt votes”, to express their neutrality, which will not affect the outcomes of the elections. Unlike in other interest groups, the Selection of the roles of president and vice president is solely decided by the number of votes that the candidates receive.





ExCo Selection Process:

Application

interested applicants will fill up an ExCo application form to indicate their interest in applying for the executive committee roles.

Voting

Applicants will each be given the opportunity to give a speech in front of the interest group, and the members will each be given one vote for who they think is the most appropriate for each role.

Selection


The Selection committee will select the most appropriate candidate for the executive committee.
